SoSA Crop Drop BECOMES A

COMMUNITY DAY

Mississippi, the Society of St. Andrew and Jackson State University have formed a strong partnership over the past couple of years. What began as an annual crop drop became a semi-annual event, then quickly blossomed into a full-blown community day.

While planning our most recent drop, we decided that more community partners were needed at the event. We invited other helping agencies from around town to participate. When asked to let us know what they would bring to the table, their responses were amazing.

One partner demonstrated how to make a container garden, and also gave away 50 kits to help people start their own gardens. Another partner provided on-site cooking demonstrations and taste-tests of the very produce that we gave away. Community residents learned new recipes using the food they received, and tasted how delicious it can be when cooked in various ways. Some partners brought additional produce

With your help, the Society of St. Andrew has been at this work since 1983, always focused on getting fresh, healthy surplus food from farms to the forks of people in need as

quickly as possible.




In that time, 700,000 volunteers have engaged in difficult, hot, dirty, hands-on work, picking, digging, and gathering that food to share through feeding agencies in their communities. Their hard work has put more than 2.2

billion servings of fruits and vegetables on the tables of our hungry neighbors, making "struggling to get by" just a little less difficult.

And many of our 700,000 volunteers, through their labor, have encountered for the first time, the faces of hunger in their hometowns. A morning of gleaning has led them to give regularly to the Society of St. Andrew, to waste less food, to support local farmers, to serve on the board of their local food pantry, to volunteer weekly at a soup kitchen, to lead food drives, grow a home garden, advocate for fair wages and better opportunities, or even run for local office.

One morning's work, multiplied by 700,000 volunteers over 34 years, has a pretty massive ripple effect! •

hen Kelley Patient lived in Florida, she was a frequent gleaner with the Society of St. Andrew. On Friday, September 8, now a resident of Tennessee, she was watching weather and news reports as Hurricane Irma bore down on her home state. Her mind was on the welfare of the people she cared about so




Kelley Patient, picking service berries on a gleaning day in Nashville

much back in Florida. The day was sunny and warm in Spring Hill, Tennessee and Kelley knew she had a choice. Deciding quickly, she headed to the field where SoSA volunteers prepared to glean bell peppers. In the field that day, Kelley said, "I knew I could stay at home and watch the weather and worry, not being able to do anything, or I could come out with you and do some good." One of SoSA's goals is to provide opportunity for those who desire action. Kelly Patient decided that action was better than idle worry. She and the other gleaners that day picked

420 pounds of bell peppers that went to a food pantry and a soup kitchen in some of the poorest parts of Nashville.

Later, Kelley learned that her friends and relatives survived the hurricane and were okay. Hooray for volunteers like Kelley, who, despite the concerns of their own daily lives, make the choice to take time to help others.



to give away simply because they were inspired by the



event. We even had sponsors that helped cover costs and provided logistics to ensure that this evolving event went smoothly. Other agencies exhibited the community resources they have for individuals and families in need.

The day was incredible. News reporters and radio hosts showed up to report on all the activity. Teachers from the daycare center down the street heard what was happening and brought their students to show them how many people are in need in the

community, and how others offer assistance and support.

A doctor showed up at the end of the event and asked if their free Mobile Clinic could set up at our next event to provide free screenings to participants.

Additional agencies called after the event, asking to be included in the next one.

One crop drop event, feeding hungry people in our community, turned into an amazing collaboration of helping agencies. If your organization has a crop drop planned, involve the helping agencies in your town and turn your own event into an amazing community day. •
